- communicate with a native speaker of Korean using idiomatic and cultural expressions in a controlled setting;
- explain the meanings of simple texts in Korean in a controlled setting;
- write paragraphs in Korean demonstrating better control and an understanding of Korean syntax and grammar;
- carry on a conversation on topics such as weather, shopping, entertainment, travel, and school;
- present projects about aspects of Korean culture or tradition that they have researched.
