Course goals and objectives

This course bears three credits that satisfy Pathways Flexible Core World Cultures and Global Issues. In this Pathways course, students will:

- Gather, interpret, and assess information from a variety of sources and points of view.
- Evaluate evidence and arguments critically or analytically.
- Produce well-reasoned written or oral arguments using evidence to support conclusions.
- Identify and apply the fundamental concepts and methods of a discipline or interdisciplinary field exploring world cultures or global issues.
- Analyze culture, globalization, or global cultural diversity, and describe an event or process from more than one point of view.
- Speak, read, and write a language other than English, and use that language to respond to cultures other than one's own.

More specifically, by the end of the semester, you will be able to

- demonstrate familiarity with the Korean writing system;
- communicate with a native speaker of Korean using idiomatic and cultural expressions in a controlled setting;
- explain the meanings of simple texts in Korean;
- write paragraphs in Korean demonstrating better control and an understanding of Korean syntax and grammar;
- carry on a conversation on topics such as weather, shopping, entertainment, travel, and school;
- present projects about aspects of Korean culture or tradition that students have researched.
