Catalog Course Description: This course is a continuation of ELZ101 Elementary Portuguese 1. The course is designed to further develop listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural context.

Flexible Core Objectives: World Cultures and Global Issues

This course bears three credits that satisfy Pathways Flexible Core World Cultures and Global Issues. In this Pathways course, students will:

- Gather, interpret, and assess information from a variety of sources and points of view.
- Evaluate evidence and arguments critically or analytically.
- Produce well-reasoned written or oral arguments using evidence to support conclusions.
- Identify and apply the fundamental concepts and methods of a discipline or interdisciplinary field exploring world cultures or global issues.
- Analyze culture, globalization, or global cultural diversity, and describe an event or process from more than one point of view.
- Speak, read, and write a language other than English, and use that language to respond to cultures other than one's own.

More specifically, by the end of the semester, you will be able to

- communicate orally in Portuguese on subjects covered in the topical outline;
- communicate with a native speaker of Portuguese using the graded vocabulary covered in the topical outline;
- explain the meaning of graded texts in Portuguese within the topical outline of the course;
- write coherent idiomatic Portuguese demonstrating an understanding of syntax and grammar;
- present research projects on aspects of Luso-Brazilian culture that they have researched.
